


What is the Hormonal IUD?

A long-acting, highly-effective reversable hormonal family planning method with important non-contraceptive characteristics.



The hormonal IUD can be used for prevention of pregnancy and treatment of heavy menstrual bleeding and pain

How does it work?

*Approved duration varies by country and may be up to 8 years

By releasing the hormone levonorgestrel, hormonal IUDs **thicken the cervical mucus**, preventing most sperm from entering the uterus, and **significantly inhibit sperm movement and survival** once in the uterus. Additionally, the hormonal IUD causes a resistance to the hormone that prompts the uterine lining to thicken over the course of the menstrual cycle. As a result, users often experience **much lighter or no menstrual bleeding and menstrual pain**.

Why does it matter?

Beginning with the addition of the HIUD to the UNFPA and USAID product catalogues in 2021, more and more countries have chosen to introduce the method. **Hormonal IUD is just one part of a comprehensive FP method mix** - it fills important gaps, particularly for potential users interested in its unique impact on menstruation, and may increase interest in other long-acting reversable contraceptive methods and in modern family planning in general.


